2024: A Year for Sustainable Mekong-Wide Travel The year is shaping up to meet GMS's stakeholders' high expectations. As 2024 will be the first full year for regional travel since 2019, we at the MTCO are working to make sure that today's positive signals bear fruit in the months to come.

On 28 January, we signed off on a <u>new strategic partnership</u> between Designated Areas for Sustainable Tourism Administration (DASTA), Green Destinations (GD), and the Trade Association of Asian Ecotourism Network (AEN).

This partnership will promote sustainable tourism practices in Thailand, particularly in destination management and certification. "We aim to develop tourism destinations that are not only economically viable but also environmentally and culturally sustainable," explains Ms. Suvimol Thanasarakii, Executive Director of MTCO.

From 23-26 January, we attended the ASEAN Tourism Forum (ATF) 2024 in Vientiane, Lao PDR, focusing on sustainable tourism. As part of the Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS), which includes five ASEAN Member States, the MTCO Executive Director highlighted MTCO's achievements and proposed collaboration areas between GMS and ASEAN at the ASEAN National Tourism Organizations (NTOs) Meeting. The ATF also featured discussions among ASEAN Tourism Ministers on advancing tourism and promoting ASEAN Tourism Standards to boost regional competitiveness.

Events like these signals widespread optimism surrounding the recovery of tourism in the post-pandemic era: we're hoping these signs indicate a long-term, sustainable revival of regional travel that benefits everyone!

Regional Spotlight: Nguyen Hue Street, Ho Chi Minh City, Viet Nam

The southern Viet Nam metropolis of Ho Chi Minh City is great to visit all year round – but parts of the city burst into full color during the Lunar New Year Tet holiday.

From 7-14 February, take a stroll down Nguyen Hue street to admire the street's annual Flower Festival. This pedestrian boulevard will be transformed with elaborate flower displays, artwork, and LED lights. Themed installations will be set up along the 720-metre stretch, and visitors are welcome to take photos with the flower arrangements – a favourite part of the city's Tet festivities. 8-14 February 2024

Tet (Lunar New Year) in Viet Nam and Chinese New Year.

This period marks significant celebrations in both Vietnam and China, as families come together to honour ancestors and pray for luck, prosperity, and health in the new year. In Vietnam, the Lunar New Year (Tết Nguyên Đán) is celebrated with special foods like candied fruit, braised pork with eggs, and sticky rice cakes (bánh chưng). Simultaneously, Chinese New Year festivities are characterized by their own unique traditions and culinary delights, symbolizing renewal and reunion. (Vietnam Tourism Ministry)





22-24 February 2024

Vat Phou Festival, Lao PDR. Held on the grounds of the pre-Angkorian ruin of Vat Phou in Champasack, Vat Phou celebrates the Buddhist festival of Makhaboucha from the full moon of the third lunar month. An early-morning parade of monks receives alms, and in the evening, some 4,000 lamps are lit around the temple, imparting an ethereal charm to the ruins. (Tourism Laos)


Myanmar
